



## Getting Here

Voted the top airport in North America 9 consecutive years, Vancouver International Airport (YVR) has 29 flights to/from the USA and more than 68 international destinations. Many major airlines fly to Vancouver including Air Canada, Air France, American Airlines, British Airways, United Airlines, Japan Airlines to name a few.



## Arriving in Vancouver

Congratulations you made it to Vancouver! Now the real challenge begins: getting from the airport to the 2019 convention centre.



### *By Train:*

Vancouver's transportation system is both convenient and easily accessible. The first train departs at around 5:30 a.m. on weekdays and the last train leaves at around 1:00 a.m. From the airport, simply follow the signs marked *Canada Line* to the Link Building (located between the International and Domestic Terminal). The train goes by every 7 minutes and the fare is \$7.15 CAD. So just hop on the Sky train, relax and enjoy the scenic ½ hour ride to downtown Vancouver!

### *By Taxi:*

If you have a lot of luggage or perhaps are a little leery of venturing onto public transportation on your own then a Taxi is always a good option. The taxi stands are located on Level 2 of the Domestic and International Arrivals Area at YVR and you can expect to pay around \$40 CAD for a ½ hour ride. Please remember to tip your driver!

## Travelling in Vancouver

### *By Foot*

Considered the "most walkable city" in Canada, Vancouver's mild weather, fresh air and excellent walking network makes it a breeze to get around on foot, and best of all its free.



### By Bike

Vancouver’s mild climate and extensive dedicated bike paths and lanes make cycling a fun and easy way to explore the city. Rent a bike with Vancouver’s public bike share system (Mobi by Shaw Go) and get ready to explore the city’s natural beauty.

### By Bus

Vancouver is a bustling city with some of its busiest bus routes running from 5 a.m. until 1 a.m! All bus stops are clearly marked throughout the city and a single adult fare is \$2.75 CAD and is valid for 90 minutes.



### By Skytrain

Known as the ‘Skytrain’, Vancouver’s rail systems is quick, efficient and fully automated – yes that means its driverless! The SkyTrain operates to 53 stations in Vancouver and the surrounding municipalities. When you are travelling by SkyTrain and SeaBus (more on that further down) it is important to note that fare is based on ‘zones’. There are three fare zones for adults:



One Zone: \$2.95

Two Zone: \$4.20

Three Zone: \$5.70



Again, tickets are valid for travel for up to 90 minutes and can be used on any mode of transportation provided it’s within the same zone.

You can also purchase a refillable Compass Card (\$6.00 refundable deposit) for use on bus or train or a DayPass fare (\$10.00) which allows for unlimited travel over all three zones for one day. These are available at Tourism Vancouver's Visitor Centre and from ticket machines in SkyTrain and SeaBus stations.



### *By Seabus*

The SeaBus is a passenger only (and wheel chair accessible) ferry service that takes you between downtown Vancouver and North Vancouver. Departures are every 15 minutes during the day from two terminals: Waterfront and Lonsdale Quay in North Vancouver. Although a short 12 minute ride, it is nonetheless scenic, offering beautiful views of Vancouver, the Burrard Inlet and the surrounding mountains.
